# Principal's Message

**Dear Parents and Carers** 

I hope you had some quality time with your children over the term break and managed to do some fun things together.

Stage 3 Camp It has been another busy start to the term, but a very happy one with all our Stage 3 students having a fantastic Camp Covid Style time. I hope the children made some long-term positive and happy memories of the experience. On the final night, one student said to me "I feel like I have 60 brothers and sisters!" Which speaks to how closely they bonded together over the three days. I would like to thank my entire staff and especially the Stage 3 teachers for ensuring that the students did not miss out on yet another experience in 2020. Swimming schemes, carnivals and assemblies occur every year, and while they are important events in a child's life, there is nothing that can replace the milestones like a final Year 6 camp or a Year 6 Farewell.

While the parties involved have asked to remain anonymous, I must thank two families who between them very generously donated \$300 towards the camp activities. Kindergarten Enrolments for 2021 and Kindergarten Orientation We are still taking enrolments for 2021 and will do so throughout Term 4. However, the earlier you get your enrolments in, the better we will be able to plan for 2021 classes, so please enrol as soon as possible or remind your neighbours to do so.

The department has given us the go ahead to hold kindergarten orientation sessions, but with restrictions on how they will be held. The sessions will be held across three days: 12, 19 and 26 November. Each child will be allocated to one of three groups and these groups will determine the time of attendance – morning, middle or afternoon. This means that if your child is in Group A and Group A is slotted for the morning, your child will attend the morning session on all three days.

We have arranged for the Excel Uniform shop to be open from 10.15am to 3.30pm on Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> November (the second orientation day) for parents to look at the uniform and get an idea for sizes. Parents will have to contact Excel directly to organise a time to visit on that day and will need to be mindful of safe health practices while in the shop or waiting. **More information on this and a lot of other things will be sent home to our new kindergarten parents shortly**. Much of this information will be sent via email, so please check your inbox regularly.

Safety at Drop Off and Pick Up Time Once again I am asking parents to slow down and think of others when dropping off and picking up their children from school. My staff and I regularly witness parents breaking the road rules, making illegal turns, illegally stopping on the zebra crossing, flying down Barrack Lane and out through the car park behind the Baptist Church (and vice versa), speeding with no chance of stopping should a child run out in front of them, double parking etc etc etc. PLEASE slow down and THINK before someone is hurt!




# Got It! Tip of the Week

While supporting your child to understand their feelings, it's often useful to help them to come up with some ways to solve the problem that triggered the feelings in the first place. They will probably need to know that you understand their feelings before they are ready to think about what to do next, so help them to take their time. You might say something like, "What do you think we should do?" or "What would make things better?". Praise them for trying hard to come up with different ideas to solve the problem and when they use more helpful strategies next time a similar situation occurs. This will help them to feel good about themselves and develop effective problem-solving skills.






# Book Week 2020 : Curious Creatures, Wild Minds



#### 2019 HSC Achievements

Girraween ranked 21st in the state overall with 9 students achieving an ATAR of 99 and over. 15 students of the cohort achieved an ATAR score over 98. The highest ATAR was 99.65 (Maximum ATAR 99.95). There were 19 "all rounder" students who achieved 90% or better in 10 units of study. 100% students received university offers.

State rankings included: 8th for Software and Design 15th for Chemistry 17th for PDHPE

313 distinguished achievers; students who achieved 90% or better in a subject

100% of all students achieved in the top two bands for History Ext, English Ext 1, Visual Arts, Software and Design, Society and Culture, Music 1 and 2. Almost 90% of students achieved in the top two bands for Legal Studies, Maths Extension 1 and 2, Business Studies and Modern History, Chemistry and Japanese.



# **Road safety** around your child's school Your child's safety depends on you

# Drop off and pick up by car

Make sure your children are in an appropriate child car seat that is fitted and used correctly.

Stick to the 40km/h speed limit in a school zone as children are about.

Look for buses pulling out – watch for flashing wig wag lights.

Always park and turn legally around schools. Avoid dangerous manoeuvres such as U-turns and three-point turns.

Always give way to pedestrians particularly when entering and leaving driveways.

Drop your children off and pick them up on the school side of the road in your school's designated drop off and pick up area. Calling out to them from across the road is dangerous – they may run to you without checking for traffic.

It's safest for children to get out of the car on the **kerb side of the road** to be away from passing traffic.

# Walking together to and from school

**Plan your trip** to school so you use pedestrian crossings where possible.

Always **hold your child's hand**. Children need your help to spot dangers such as vehicles coming out of driveways. They can also be easily distracted and wander into traffic.

Drop off and pick up your child near the school gate and avoid calling them from across the road.

Talk with your children about **Stop**, **Look**, **Listen** and **Think** every time they cross the road.

**STOP!** one step back from the kerb.

LOOK! for traffic to your right left and right again.

**LISTEN!** for the sounds of approaching traffic.

THINK! whether it is safe to cross.

Young children can learn these safe pedestrian habits from you and continue them later on when they are old enough to travel alone.

# Key points to remember around schools



# Driving and parking safely near the school

School opening and closing hours are busy times for pedestrian and vehicular traffic outside the school.

Always take extra care in 40km/h school zones, which operate on gazetted school days.

Park safely even if it means walking further to the school gate.

Observe all parking signs. They are planned with children's safety in mind.

NEVER double park as it puts children at risk.

Model safe and considerate behaviour for your child – they will learn from you.

Slow down near the school crossing.

At a supervised crossing, observe the directions of the school crossing supervisor.

Always park and turn legally around the school. **Avoid dangerous manoeuvres** such as U-turns and three-point turns.

Always **give way to pedestrians** particularly when entering and leaving driveways.

Avoid parking across the school driveway or the entrance to the school car park.

Using your school's drop off and pick up facility will help keep all children as safe as possible during the busiest times of the school day.

Avoid parking in or near the school bus bay.




