

Got It! Tip of the Week

While it's important to let your child know that all their feelings are OK, it's also important to let them know that some behaviours are not OK. These behaviours include hurting themselves or others, or damaging property. You can guide them to think of more helpful ways to handle their strong feelings. For instance, you might say to them: "You are mad that Sally took that doll from you. I would be too, but it is not OK to hit her. What could you do instead?". This will help them to trust their feelings and feel good about themselves while learning to manage their own behaviour.

Volkswagen 1300 Beetle 1966 - her name is "Lady"



Thanks to the Vassallo family for allowing us to borrow "Lady" for a morning this week. She has had a fascinating history:

1965 -This beetle was manufactured in Germany. It would have been right hand drive-with the odometer in miles.

1966 -This beetle was bought and delivered to Johannesburg, South Africa. It was then converted to left hand drive and the odometer changed to kilometres.

1972 - This beetle came to Sydney to live in Eastwood where is was converted back to right hand drive and the odometer changed back to miles. The car has two odometers.

1994 - The car was bought by a young lady (16 years old) who had just got her learners permit and lived in Rooty Hill. The owner moved to South West Rocks with the car and as the car was no longer suitable for her family's needs, she decided to sell.

2019 - Chloe and Adam's family bought the car and drove to South West Rocks to pick it up and brought Lady back to Blacktown to live.

Plastic Fantastic?

Plastic is an amazing man-made material. It's cheap to produce and has many uses – from pens, food containers and hard hats to prosthetic legs and car parts. But *half* of the plastic we produce is designed to be used *just once* and then thrown away - such as food packaging, balloons and straws, much of which ends up in the ocean.

Because plastic takes over 400 hundred years to start to break down, it stays in our environment, causing damage for a dangerously long time. Even when it finally does break down, it breaks down into our eco-system, which we rely upon for food, which means this is very unhealthy for animals and humans.

4/5Magenta has been investigating and researching how we use plastic in our homes and at school, since it became popular in our everyday use during the 1960's. Students have been brainstorming ideas on how we can use less single use plastic packaging with our recess and lunch packaging.

In addition, students have started to collect used whiteboard markers, pens and textas from all of the classrooms around the school. These old markers, textas and pens will be taken to Officeworks for recycling.

Take a look at the amount of plastic they have collected in just 10 weeks! This collection of markers, pens and textas ends up measuring 63 metres of plastic that will now be recycled instead of ending up in landfill or in our oceans!

History in 3/4Crimson

After delving into life in the 1960's, 3/4 Crimson have been learning about Australia before Captain Philip sailed into Sydney Harbour with the First Fleet. They have been watching Arnhem Land family elders teaching the children how to find bush medicine; make and paint a didgeridoo; gather pandanus grasses to create mats and baskets; make a fishing spear and cut bark for bark paintings. As part of their learning, students have written procedures for some of these traditions and created designs for their own images.

Everyone was intrigued at how the family was able to create paint from rocks and dye from the roots of plants. They were also surprised to hear the aboriginal language being spoken as the elders helped the children learn their traditions. Here is some of our work.
















Longneck Leadership Training Day




