Principal's Message

Dear Parents and Carers,

We have had a very settled start to 2024 in Term 1 and I take this opportunity to thank all of our community - parents, staff and students - for a great start to the year.

Kindergarten 2024 I have been particularly impressed with our newest community members - our Kindergarten students - who have taken to big school in a positive and grown up manner. They have settled well into school routines and are eager to learn in their classrooms and to make friends in the playground.

Safe and Respectful School While 99% of our community treat each other in a respectful way, as in all social environments, in our school community there is a small number of people - big and little - who treat and speak to each other disrespectfully and at times cruelly with the intent to hurt the other person. In every Department school across NSW, everyone has the right to feel safe. Not just from a possible threat of physical violence, but from the hurtful and nasty words of others. This is just a reminder that disrespectful behaviour towards others will not be tolerated in our school - from anyone. I draw your attention to the NSW Department of Education Behaviour Code for Students and Community Charter contained later in this newsletter. Also please remember that children learn their behaviours from the adults around them.

Improper Behaviour of Students Outside the School Gate This is just a reminder that when school students misbehave or act cruelly or inappropriately outside of the school's grounds, there is little the school can do in terms of reprimanding the children involved UNLESS this behaviour occurs when the child is in school uniform. Any behaviour that brings discredit to the Department or a particular school will be followed up and dealt with. In any case, whether the child(ren) is in school uniform or not, the police and the Department rely on members of the public to identify poor or malicious behaviour and to call it out. I remind you that, according to the police:

The community has the right to photograph anyone in a public space (ie. out and about in the neighbourhood) who is committing an illegal act, and to pass that photograph on to police for follow up and identification. Provided the photograph clearly shows possible or actual anti-social/illegal behaviour, the photograph can be taken of a child or children without fear of any consequence.

The Department of Education's Legal Service have also advised that:

If you have photographic /video evidence of anti-social / illegal behaviour – particularly from established video security systems, these digital records can also be submitted to police for further follow up even if this involves a child. This particular regulation falls under the Surveillance Devices Act 2007 NSW.

At school we try to teach our students to be upstanders, not bystanders. If you see any illegal or anti-social behaviour being carried out by anyone, please report it - especially over the school holidays.

Thanks to My Amazing Staff I would like to take this opportunity to thank my amazing staff for keeping the school ticking over so efficiently during my recent leave. Special thanks to Mrs Tracy Stewart for keeping the school going smoothly and to Ms Amanda Cash for running the office and finance side of things. We have an incredible group of teachers and support staff at our school. I couldn't do my job without them.



Kindergarten + Year 1 Mermaid and Great Mackerel

Our Kindy students have now been at Big School for 40 days. Every 10 days we complete a fun learning activitiy that helps us practise counting to ten and develop our fine motor skills. We have made paper chains, beaded bracelets, made a city landscape and at 40 days decorated a superhero cape!

Our Kindy students have learned to recognise some letters and their most common sound. We are experimenting with blending these letters together to read words and are now learning to write some of these words into sentences.



Our Year One students love reading groups. They are learning to blend trickier letter combinations and fluently read Magic 100 words. Our favourite activities are using the whisper phones where we can listen to ourselves read and completing phonics tasks independently on the iPads.





Stage 1

In science, Stage 1 have been busy learning about living things and how they grow and change. We have also been learning about how plants and animals are used for food and fibre products, as well as exploring techniques used to prepare food safely and hygienically.

During science and library lessons, we collaboratively worked together to research a plant or animal life cycle and order the stages/phases in the cycle.



We conducted experiments to discover how to keep a sliced apple fresh - honey water was the best liquid to use!



We also looked at the process that products go through to get from the farm to the shops, such as the journey of milk.

Stage 2 - 3/4 Ocean

Term 1 has flown by! We have achieved so much and are finding our groove to do our best learning together. Here are just a few examples of our learning from this term:

Buddy class time with 1/2L

We do a variety of activities with 1/2L. This term we have coloured in bookmarks, done some shared reading and had some outdoor games. Our favourite activity was making Easter Bunnies on Milk Arrowroot biscuits that we could eat!















English

We have been engaging in a variety of reading and writing tasks every day.


Science with Mrs Yousef

Behaviour code for students

Information for students and parents or carers

NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive, and responsive learning environments for everyone across a range of settings. We teach and model the inclusive and safe behaviours we value in our students.

In NSW public schools students are expected, to the best of their ability, to:

- show respect to other students, their teachers and school staff and community members
- follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers
- strive for the highest standards in learning
- act in a courteous and respectful way that makes all members of the school community feel valued, included and supported
- · resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- meet the school's agreed uniform policy or dress code
- attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- respect all property
- be safe and not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol, vapes, e-cigarettes or tobacco into our schools
- not bully, harass, intimidate, or discriminate against anyone in our schools.

Schools take action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high-quality teaching and learning.

All students have a right to:

- safety at school
- · access and fully participate in their learning
- be treated with respect by other students, teachers and school staff
- express their views, set goals and self-advocate.

The principal and school staff, using their professional judgment, are best placed to maintain discipline and provide safe, supportive and responsive learning environments and apply an appropriate action when students are not meeting these expectations. The department is responsible for the provision of a policy framework and resources such as legal issues bulletins, access to specialist advice, and professional learning to guide principals and their staff in exercising their professional judgment.

In this context, the NSW Government and the Department of Education will back the authority and judgment of principals and school staff at the local level.

Behaviour code for students: Student actions

Promoting the inclusion, learning, wellbeing, and safety of all students in NSW public schools is a high priority for the Department of Education.

We implement teaching and learning approaches across a range of settings to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for respectful, safe and engaged behaviour.

To meet the expectations set out above, students in NSW public schools, to the best of their ability, should adhere to the following principles.

Respect

- Treat one another with dignity.
- Communicate and behave courteously.
- Act and work cooperatively with other students, teachers, and school staff.
- Develop positive and respectful relationships.
- Value the interests, ability and culture of others.
- · Respect the learning needs of other students.
- Dress appropriately by wearing the agreed school uniform or dress code.
- Take care with school property and the property of staff and other students.



Safety

- Model and follow school and class rules and expectations around behaviour and conduct.
- Negotiate and resolve conflict.
- Be aware of and take responsibility for how their behaviour and actions impact others.
- Care for self and others.
- Be safe and help others to make safe choices that do not hurt themselves or others.

Engagement

- Arrive at school and class on time.
- Be prepared for every lesson.
- Actively participate in learning.
- Aspire and strive to achieve the highest standards of learning.

Telephone interpreter service

Tell the operator the phone number you want to call and the operator will get an interpreter on the line to assist you with the conversation. You will not be charged for this service.

NSW public schools work to create positive environments for students, staff and the entire school community that support student learning. We strive to ensure that every student is known, valued and cared for.

The best education happens when parents and schools work together.

Positive environments

It is important that our NSW public schools are positive environments and that parents and carers are kept informed of students' progress and school announcements.

Parents and carers can expect:

- To be welcomed into our schools to work in partnership to promote student learning.
- Communication from school staff will be timely, polite and informative.
- Professional relationships with school staff are based on transparency, honesty and mutual respect.
- To be treated fairly. Tolerance and understanding are promoted as we respect diversity.

Communicating with our schools

Our staff will find a time to talk to you when they can give you their full attention. Please remember that while our staff are in class or dealing with other matters, they may not be available to answer your questions immediately.

Our schools and communities will make sure that written communication is appropriate, fair and easy to read. We encourage you to use email and social media appropriately to connect with your school and stay up-to-date with up-coming events in the school community.

Respectful communication is a right

In all workplaces people have the right to feel respected. Unacceptable and offensive behaviour has no place in our school communities.

To ensure the wellbeing of students, staff and the community in our schools, steps will be taken to address unacceptable behaviour. This may include restricting contact with the school community or, in more serious cases, referral to NSW Police.

Unacceptable behaviour may include but is not limited to:

- Aggressive or intimidating actions, such as violence, threatening gestures or physical proximity.
- Aggressive or intimidating language, including the use of obscenities, making sexist, racist or derogatory comments or using a rude tone.
- Treating members of the school community differently due to aspects such as their religion or disability.
- Inappropriate and time wasting communication.
